

# PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

As Term 2 comes to a close, I wish to compliment the majority of students who have adjusted well to new school guidelines including handing their phones in at the student reception each morning. Most students have also tried their best to be at school and importantly in class on time. Students' online interactions remain a great concern, with social media often stirring up trouble and creating division amongst students. This can be very hurtful for all involved and results in staff having to spend a disproportionate amount of time sorting it out.

Today's young people are the first generation to grow up with Smart devices, many having had a smartphone from the age of ten. Recent research has revealed the extent of adverse effects caused by unrestricted access to social media.

Phone addiction, anxiety, depression, cyber bullying, disrupted sleep patterns and most disturbingly increased youth suicide rates are some of the impacts of unrestricted, unsupervised online activity. Addressing these challenges with older students may feel daunting, but it's crucial to initiate conversations and monitor their social media use. For younger children, it's a chance to research and consider delaying their access to devices and to online content. ## END THE PHONE-BASED CHILDHOOD NOW

### The environment in which kids grow up today is hostile to human development

In the early 2010s, a troubling shift began to affect adolescents worldwide, marked by an alarming increase in rates of depression, anxiety, and suicide. These issues, previously stable or improving, surged dramatically among Generation Z, born in 1996 and later. In the United States alone, rates of depression and anxiety rose by over 50 percent in many studies, while the suicide rate among adolescents aged 10 to 19 increased by 48 percent. For girls aged 10 to 14, the rise in suicide rates was a staggering 131 percent. This trend wasn't isolated to the U.S.; similar patterns emerged in Canada, the U.K., Australia, New Zealand, Nordic countries, and beyond. Generation Z has been experiencing higher levels of anxiety, depression, self-harm, and related disorders compared to previous generations for which data is available. The decline in mental health is just one aspect of a broader societal shift. Loneliness and social isolation among American teens began to escalate around 2012. Concurrently, academic performance also showed signs of decline. National and international assessments, such as "The Nation's Report Card" in the U.S. and the PISA evaluations globally, noted decreases in reading, math, and science scores after 2012, reversing previous trends of improvement.

These troubling developments suggest a complex interplay of social, academic, and possibly technological factors shaping the experiences of adolescents in the early 2010s. Understanding and addressing these issues are crucial for supporting the mental health and well-being of current and future generations facing unprecedented challenges in an increasingly connected and fast-paced world.

#### Some Solutions


1. No smartphones before high school.
2. No social media until 16.

Social media platforms expose children to a wide variety of harms, including sextortion, feelings of inadequacy, and contact with ill-intentioned strangers; there is no way to make it appropriate for children. Link up with the parents of your child's friends to commit together to not allowing your children to open social media accounts until 16.


1. Advocate for phone-free schools.
4. Give more independence, free play, and responsibility in the real world kids develop social skills and overcome anxiety naturally through independence and unsupervised play.
5. Remember phones are not an essential part of life, they can and should be removed if you feel they are not being used appropriately.

# The Dangers of Mobile Phone Use for Teens

The more teens use their cell phones, the greater their risk of exposure to both experiencing and engaging in inappropriate or "mis-use" cell phone activity.



Teens who are cell phone "mis-users" are more likely than non-mis-users to hide their cell phone activity from their parents and agree that their parents only know some of what they do on their cell phones. Many teens have parental rules for their cell phone usage, but the enforcement of these rules occurs less frequently for mis-users.



A total of 503 United States respondents ages 13-17 who own or regularly use a cell phone were surveyed online from October 13 - November 2, 2011. Data were weighted to be representative of 13-17 year olds in the United States. Figures for age, sex, race/ethnicity, region, urbanicity, and parents' highest level of education were weighted where necessary to bring them into line with their actual proportions in the population.



# RTO UPDATE

## Guest Speaker- Local Author David Whish-Wilson

As part of the Certificate II in General Education for Adults (CGEA) program, various students had the opportunity to participate in a creative writing workshop led by local author David Whish-Wilson.

David's literary career took off with his first novel, "Line of Sight," part of the Frank Swann crime series, which earned a Ned Kelly Award nomination in 2012. He has since penned three more novels in the series, gaining recognition both locally and internationally.

Beyond writing, David is passionate about education and social impact. He teaches creative writing in the prison system, having initiated Fiji's first prisoner writing program. Currently residing in Fremantle, Western Australia, with his partner and three children, David also shares his expertise as a creative writing instructor at Curtin University.

During the workshop, students received valuable tips on writing analysis and construction, which aligned with the English units in their CGEA qualification. Additionally, David shared insights into his career as an author, offering inspiration and advice. This session also provided a valuable opportunity for professional development and networking for our CGEA trainers.




## Robotics and Problem Solving with Murdoch University- STEM Program

On May 8th, Murdoch University hosted an engaging incursion for our Certificate II GEA students in Years 10-12. The day featured two dynamic workshops, "Hyperspeed Hijinks" and "Let's Get Rolling." In "Hyperspeed Hijinks," students faced a series of engineering-themed logic puzzles, racing against time to escape a simulated train environment before their "oxygen" ran out.

The "Let's Get Rolling, Let's Get Coding" workshop offered a hands-on introduction to robotics programming. Students used Sphero robots to learn basic programming strategies, competing in tasks that honed their coding skills and ignited their interest in robotics.

This incursion provided professional development for our trainers and gave students valuable insights into the fields of engineering and programming.

A highlight of the day was meeting Murdoch's very own robo-dog, designed by PhD student Shiqi Peng in 2006. The robo-dog, featuring advanced control systems like Reinforced Learning and Subsumption Architecture, has been a key educational tool since 2013. It now serves to teach students essential concepts in debugging, electronics, and programming.

## Term-2: Printmaking

In term two, our students have explored various print mediums using our new heavy-duty press! Our project theme "Fight or Flight," has inspired a wide variety of meaningful and personal responses. Students tried their hand at printmaking techniques including lino cutting, laser engraved woodblock prints, Holbein etching, and photographic cyanotypes. Each student created a print plate based on their own interpretation of the theme, exploring every step of the creative process from design through to creating their own edition of prints. Many of these limited edition prints will be for sale at our upcoming art exhibition. Building on this foundation, students who completed their prints have now embarked on creating paintings or watercolour works of their favourite fairy tales, adding a twist to these classic stories. Drawing inspiration from the darker stylistic influences of artists like Stormie Mills and Shaun Tan, our students have crafted intriguing and thought-provoking pieces that reimagine these classic fables in a new and unexpected way.







# Kitchen Garden

## Term-2, 2024

### What's New in our Patch

Term 2 has been a great time for the garden.

Firstly we have settled into our new shed, kindly built for us by André and Tim - thanks guys, it's perfect! This term has also shown some exciting results for our in-ground worm farms. Now that we have learned how to optimise growing conditions (pH and moisture levels), the worms are thriving, reproducing, and feeding our veggies. Our worms are Red Tigers and they are a very hungry species of composting worm that can eat twice their weight in scraps each day. They allow us to utilise far more food scraps from the kitchen

Prevention is better than cure, so we have purchased materials to construct support frames and pest netting as a physical barrier to keep pests out as this remains our biggest challenge. We will begin construction on these next term. The structures will also be able to support shade cloth during the hotter summer months, to prevent crops from getting burnt. We will provide an update next term, but meanwhile, enjoy the rain and the change of seasons!

## Year 12s your time is now!



The re-enactment demonstrates the consequences of distracted driving, speeding, drink and drug driving and informs students on how to reduce risk taking behaviours




# Outdoor Experiences





Subjects and options that operate in the new learning space include, Independent Study, FlexiTrack, Games and Puzzles, and Craft.



## Managing Digital Overload

In an era of constant digital connectivity, issues can arise from constant social media and communication platform notifications. The pressure to attain the elusive 'inbox zero' across personal and professional channels can escalate to mental fatigue and a sense of being swamped. This relentless online presence can detrimentally affect real-life relationships by diluting the capacity for significant in-person engagement.

## The Strain of Social Burnout

The surge in communication apps amplifies the pressure to participate online. This can steer individuals towards social burnout and distancing as mechanisms to cope with this stress. Frequent social media detoxes and setting communication boundaries with others can reduce this strain.

## Strategies to Avoid Digital Overload

In the battle against digital overload, notifications can be disabled to avert burnout. However, this strategy can result in unopened messages building and a subsequent sense of guilt for delayed responses. Planning social activities with minimal phone use and designating specific times for social media can be a good personal boundary.

## The Persistent Pressure of Online Responsiveness

Despite these measures, the strain to be immediately responsive persists, especially given features that reveal online activity to others. This can potentially damage relationships and foster resentment. Holgate concludes that the urgency of online communication might be causing harm to relationships from both ends - those feeling overwhelmed and those feeling ignored.
