Serious impact on education and reduces life chances! EXTREMELY CONCERNING

Good attendance means being in school at least 94% of the time or 180-190 days. Did you know? A two week holiday in term time means that the highest attendance you can achieve is 94.5%.

THE IMPACTS OF POOR ATTENDANCE AT SCHOOL

Lower academic achievement

Students who frequently miss school are likely to fall behind in their studies. This can lead to lower grades and difficulty keeping up with the curriculum.

Increased risk of school failure

Persistent absenteeism is a strong predictor of school failure and can lead to repeating grades or even dropping out of school.

Higher dropout rates

GOOD

Students with poor attendance are at a greater risk of dropping out of school. Dropout rates are higher among students who miss a significant amount of school.

Decreased social skills

Regular interaction with peers is crucial for developing social skills. Students who are frequently absent may struggle with social integration and relationship-building.



Emotional Distress

Chronic absenteeism can be both a symptom and a cause of emotional issues. such as anxiety or depression.

Increased Behavioural ssues

Students who miss school regularly may develop behavioural problems, including disengagement, defiance. and a lack of motivation. These issues can further exacerbate their attendance problems.

Higher Risk of Delinquency

Research has shown that students with poor school attendance are at a higher risk of engaging in delinguent behaviour.

Impact on Community

Low school attendance can affect community well-being, as it is linked to broader issues such as increased crime rates and lower community engagement.

Increased feeling of isolation

Absenteeism can lead to feelings of alienation and isolation, as students may miss out on important social interactions and extracurricular activities.



DEPUTY PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

By the time you are reading this, we will have been travelling through Malaysia with six students who have been experiencing the amazing culture, food and sounds of the country as well as visiting Klang Special School.

Dionne and I are very fortunate to be the ones not only representing Port, but be taking students away for this amazing exoerience of a lifetime.



The relationship is now in its twelfth year and Port has seen 71 students visit Malaysia over that time. They have been part of raising well over \$200k and have donated equipment, resources, sponsored a new playground, taken over arts and sculptures and sponsored over 100 orphan students over that time.

Past Student Visit

The school was delighted earlier this term to have a visit from Courtney Knowles a past student. Courtney was at Port from 2014 - 2016 and is now working for St Jude's as an individual support worker, assisting adults in the areas mental health, elderly and disabilities. Courtney was part of the 2015 Malaysia group and has fond memories of the trip as well as helping with construction of the YPC and ELC back then. Courtney has a



beautiful 2 year old daughter Arianna who enjoyed a play in the ELC with other children during their visit. Great to see you doing so well Courtney.

MICRO-CREDENTIALS

A micro-credential is a certification that proves you've learned a specific skill or competency. It takes at least one hour to complete and is smaller than a full qualification. It can be an extra, alternative, or complementary part of an official qualification. In addition, they can assist in employment chances and may be a compulsory industry requirement.

Well done to students that have completed any or all of these!

First Aid

Each year, students staff and complete First Aid Training- a Nationally Accredited certificate which includes CPR, basic first aid and emergency life support components. This certificate provides three units of competency for students, one of which is included in some Port School qualifications, and various external qualifications.

Sam Kerridge has successfully facilitated the training through ABC First Aid.

White Card

A White Card is evidence of completing a General Construction Induction course. This course is mandatory for anyone who works or wants to work in the construction industry. The course is delivered and accessed via an online platform through Blue Dog Training- with assistance from Port School staff.

Responsible Service of Alcohol (RSA)

The Responsible Service of Alcohol (RSA) course teaches you how to serve alcohol safely and legally. It helps prevent alcohol-related issues, improves customer service, and is often required for jobs in hospitality.

Use Hand & Power Tools

This unit teaches the skills and knowledge needed to use hand and power tools in the resources and infrastructure industries. It's designed for people in operational roles who work under supervision, follow set routines and procedures, and are responsible for the quality of their own work.




This term every senior student in English class was given a personalised journal, numerous studies show that writing provides psychological benefits by helping us make sense of life's emotional highs and lows, with greater cognitive effort leading to deeper meaning (Ullrich & Lutgendorf, 2002). Journaling is more than just writing down thoughts; it's a powerful tool for self-expression, reflection, and personal growth. Each journal is a personal space to explore thoughts, ideas, and emotions.

Keeping a journal offers benefits. It helps process experiences, enhances writing skills, and fosters creativity. Journaling can also reduce stress by giving students a safe outlet to express their emotions. As they track their personal growth over time, students can gain valuable insights into their lives, helping them develop a stronger sense of self and numerous studies also show a strong connection between handwriting skills and literacy development.

Journaling also works as intrinsic motivation. When students are given the freedom to write for themselves, without the pressure of results or expectations, they begin to find joy in the process of writing. It may become an act of self-discovery and confidence-building This kind of motivation is crucial, as it encourages students to take ownership of their learning and fosters a lifelong love for writing.

By building this habit of reflection and expression, students can better navigate their academic and personal challenges. NAILING YOUR VIRTUAL JOB INTERVIEW

Speak with clarity, confidence and competence

Are you nervous about job interviews? Do you want to create a great first impression?

Have you noticed that many employers are now requesting either pre-recorded introductory videos or live virtual interviews?

Unfortunately, many people crumble the second the camera starts to roll, and this can lead to missed opportunities to share your personality, skills and strengths when it matters.

Being able to speak in a calm, cool, and collected manner in front of the camera will give your future employer confidence that you have great communication skills, and these are critical skills needed in any workplace.

Tips to help you navigate your on-camera interview

Know who you are: Develop your personal introduction narrative/story. Who are you? what are you interested in and why? This is brief and gives the interviewer a sense of who you are and why you might be a great fit for the role.

Don't talk to strangers: Consider who you will be speaking to. Will there be one person or a panel of people? Do a little bit of research. A lot of information can be found on the organisation's website or you can ask.

Not just any job: Share why you would like to work at this organisation. This shows the interviewer you are not just wanting any job, you have done your homework and you believe your skills, values and what you can contribute align to not only the role but also the organisation.

Presentation matters: The way you dress and present yourself matters. This shows the interviewer that you have made an effort and gives an indication of how you may show up in the workplace. Hair off the face, spotlessly clean and ironed shirt or blouse/dress, avoid too much jewellery or other distracting accessories and think about how the colour might show up on camera. Plain colours work better than prints on camera.

Etiquette matters too: Smile - smiling is a universal language that makes you more approachable.

Posture - sit or stand straight with your head up and shoulders back. Eye Contact - make eye contact with the interviewer or the camera. And always thank them for their time and/or the opportunity.

Listen carefully: If the interview is live/virtual pay close attention to any question being asked. Ensure you fully understand it before responding. If needed, you can ask for clarification. You can do this by asking a clarifying question. Eg. Would you like to know what I have finished studying or what I am currently studying?

Speak with clarity and brevity. Keep your answers focused and to the point. Avoid rambling or straying off-topic. A clear and concise response is more impactful. The interviewer will ask you more questions if they need a little more information.

Don't be shy sharing your strengths: This is the time to share with the interviewer all the skills and strengths you have, including your personality. You can also share some personal examples of your achievements.

You are a life-long learner: Share with your interviewer that you are always keen to learn more.

Be human: If you don't know the answer to a question, it's okay to admit it. Authenticity and honesty builds trust.

Use the power pause: There is no need to rush. Take the time you need to think about the question and your answer before speaking. A thoughtful response is better than a rushed response.

Ask questions: In a live interview, ask a couple of questions to show interest. You can prepare a couple beforehand. Eg. How long has your business been operating in this location? or will there be opportunities for professional development in the future?


Enjoy the experience: Learn to enjoy interviews. Even if you don't get the job this time. The next one might be an even better fit.
















CERTIFICATE IN GENERAL EDUCATION FOR ADULTS

CGEAI

The Certificate I in General Education was introduced at the start of Term 3. There are 5 workbooks that make up the Certificate I in General Education for Adults. This term we focused on the computing cluster and maths cluster. We have had 10 students commence the course in the Senior School this term and have had 3 of those students complete the computer cluster and commence the maths cluster.

CGEAII

This term our topic of focus in the CGEA classroom was Work, Health & Safety. The unit encompasses safe work practices, safety signs, identifying hazards, risk assessments and emergency evacuation procedures. Students also complete a Smartmove Certificate which informs them on how to recognise potential dangers, risks and hazards in the workplace; whilst giving them the tools to stay safe in the workplace.

CGEA III

We currently have 15+ students working on the Certificate III in General Education for Adults at Port School. This is the highest intake of students doing the Certificate III that we have had since the course was introduced. This course extends students language, literacy, numeracy and IT skills and sets students up well to work independently in external studies such as TAFE and University.

Today's HASS newsletter focus is dedicated to sharing part of this message with students' parents, carers, and families & features online safety hacks to strengthen our online safety.

The Key Dangers of the Internet

So much of our daily life revolves around the internet, from work to education and even talking and gaming with friends. For some interesting up to date statistics on social media usage look up this link: https://www.genroe.com/blog/social-media-statistics-australia/13492.

When you and your family use the internet, you are (often unknowingly) exposing yourself to a wide range of potential online threats. Digital landscapes are constantly changing nowadays, and to avoid their inherent dangers, we recommend following our essential internet safety tips when you are online:

- 1. Make sure you're using a secure internet connection
- 2. Choose strong passwords
- 3. Enable multi-factor authentication where you can
- 4. Keep software and operating systems updated
- 5. Check that websites 'look' and 'feel' reliable
- 6. Review your privacy settings and understand privacy policies
- 7. Be careful of suspicious links and where you click
- 8. Make sure your devices are secure!
- 9. Backup data regularly
- 10. Close unused accounts
- 11. Be careful what you download
- 12. Be careful what you post and where
- 13. Be careful who you meet online
- 14. Double check online information
- 15. Use a good antivirus and keep it updated

PE and Team Sport









Jon Kroeck

There goes term 3 flying past. This was a very busy term for students and staff completing two days Professional Development and the Art Exhibition within a week.

We usually spend a lot time writing about the achievements of students, in this newsletter we are going to spend our staff do. Belinda Carcione, Jon Kroeck, Sam Kerridge, Jane Hawdon and Lorraine O'Toole make up the Port Outreach Team, fondly known as POP. The POP Team work at Port providing a mobile education service to students on site. The POP team works rain, hail and shine to support students to achieve their learning goals.



Jon has been working on the POP team with students since the beginning of 2022. He originates from California but has called Australia home for the past 15 years. Jon has been working in the education sector for most of his career, getting his diploma as a teacher in Elementary Education with a focus on psychology before receiving his Master of International Sustainable Tourism. He used this time to research how experiential education affected students, their ability to learn in a some time writing about the great work more hands-on environment, and whether it improved their retention of taught information.

Jon's favourite part of being on the POP team is the ability to create one-on-one relationships with his students. While we tend to make do, sometimes our sessions need to be cut short, or at least come to a brief pause as we watch a motorist doing skids at the stop lights.

> When all is said and done, Jon hopes to bring his whole self to his students on POP. He wants to show them that making mistakes is okay, people aren't perfect. The most important thing is we can all be ourselves and still find people who love us for just that. We want to teach respect and kindness, and that it's fine to not always be happy. Laughing, as long as it is with others, heals a lot more than we think. And lastly, just do the work, kids, without complaining! It is an education program after all!

Sam is a primary and high school qualified teacher with a commitment to making a positive impact on the lives of teenagers. He currently works in the Outreach program at Port School, supporting students who may be struggling to engage with traditional education systems. Sam holds a degree in Psychology as well as a diploma in counselling. Recognising the importance of education as a tool for change, Sam later pursued and completed a degree in education.

Sam's passion for teaching is driven by his belief in the power of meaningful engagement with young people. He is particularly passionate about connecting with teenagers, understanding the unique challenges they face, and helping them find their path forward.
